GENERAL INQUIRIES:

- Contract terms and agreements will be negotiated with the selected company.
- The Department of Justice (DOJ) Agreement provided with the addendum is the current agreement on file.
- The provider shall not provide medical services for County employees. This includes UI drug screening physicals, new-hire physicals, Hepatitis B Vaccinations, or Flu shots.
- The detention officer assesses inmates at intake. Currently the County pays for any certification and training.
- The ADC does not house an infirmary.
- For the year 2015, there were 340 males to every 81 females inmates on average.
- The average number of inmates for the year 2015 are as follows:

ASSOCIATED EXPENSES:

- The current MD, Dr. Hayes, is compensated \$42,000 annually with no back-fill time. His contract with Sebastian County will end as of 5/31/16.
- The current Psychiatrist, Dr. Kevin Price, is compensated \$24,000 annually for his services, none of which are tele-psych and no back-fill time. The County also works with Western Arkansas Guidance Counseling (WACG).
- The full-time RN/HSA is compensated \$59,117 annually; their back-up is a full-time LPN.
- The two (2) full-time LPNs are compensated \$32,779 each annually.
- The part-time RN is compensated \$22,100 annually
- The four (4) part-time LPNs are compensated \$13,260 each annually.

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HOSPITALIZATION, SPECIALTY SERVICES, AND OFF-SITE:

- The County currently gets the following discounts for off-site services: 62% at Sparks Hospital, 40% for Emergency Medical Services (EMS), 20% Cisternia and Medicaid.
- Currently the Medical Administrative Assistant reviews and manages the County's inmate off-site hospital bills and claims.
- No OB/GYN programs and services are currently provided at the ADC. The County currently uses AHEC, Department of Health, and Mercy. Over the past three years (2013, 2014, 2015) and 2016-to-date we have made seventeen (17) transports to these providers.
- The County currently uses Fort Smith Emergency Services for their EMS. On average there are two (2) calls per month ranging in price from \$600-\$1,000.

PHARMACY:

- The most prescribed pharmaceuticals are: Clonidine, Gabapentin, Hydroxyzine, Lisinopril, Meloxicam, Metformin, Metoprolol, Omeprazole, Prazosin, Ranitidine, Simvastatin, Amoxicillin, Phenytoin, and Atenolol. The County currently uses Allcare for its pharmaceuticals.
- The most prescribed psychotropic drugs are: Amitriptyline, Sertraline, Citalopram, Trazodone, Bupropion SR, Lithium Carbonate, Mirtazapine, Perphenazine, Chlorpromazine, Haloperidol, Doxepin, Venlafaxine, Escitalopram, Abilify, Aripiprazole, Bupropion XL, Olanzapine, Quetiapine Fumarate, Risperidone, and Invega.
- All over the counter medications are kept in stock and provided by local distributors.
- The County does not allow inmates any keep on person (KOP) medications.
- The County does allow inmates' family members to provide medications.
- The County currently manages three (3) medication passes per day. The medication pass times are 0500, 1600 and 2100. The medications are passed in the pods.
- The County does not distribute narcotics. They are locked in a lockbox.
- The County owns and utilizes two (2) medication carts per day.
- When an inmate is transferred to another facility the County sends their medication with them.
- The County does not allow methadone to be prescribed.
